Compliance

Under the Australian Grocery
Code of Conduct the retailer
and wholesaler are
responsible for:

- Training staff
- Keeping records

COMPLIANCE TRAINING FOR RETAILERS AND WHOLESALERS

The retailer and wholesaler are responsible for training:

- Buying teams on code's requirements within 6 months of code acceptance.
- New team members must receive code training promptly.
- Annual retraining sessions ensure continuous compliance understanding.



RECORD KEEPING GROCERY SUPPLY AGREEMENTS

Retailers and wholesalers must:

- Maintain copies of grocery supply agreements they are a party to.
- Keep all documents during the agreement term and for 6 years after it ends.



RECORD KEEPING - NOTICES AND DECISIONS

These records include:

- Maintaining records of notices, decisions, and actions.
- Offers for agreement variations, delisting decisions, and outcome reviews.
- Notices of required changes to packaging, supply changes, and price negotiations.



ENHANCING ACCOUNTABILITY THROUGH DOCUMENTATION

Detailed record-keeping is vital for:

- Code compliance.
- Demonstration of adherence to guidelines and transparency.
- Resolving disputes and building trust with suppliers.
